

CAN YOU TRANSPORT BULK DIESEL WITHOUT A HAZMAT?

HOW TO TRANSPORT BULK DIESEL WITHOUT A HAZMAT

Boss Trailers has engineered a fuel and service trailer that can be legally towed by anyone with a standard driver's license. In this guide, we'll break down the relevant DOT regulations and explain how the Multi-Tank Trailer is designed to bypass the HAZMAT endorsement requirement—when used within proper guidelines.

Code of Federal Regulations

The Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) outlines the rules set related to diesel fuel transportation detailed in **Title 49**.

A HAZMAT endorsement on a Commercial Driver's License (CDL) is required to transport hazardous materials. According to **49 CFR 383.93**, the term "hazardous" is defined as:

• 49 CFR 383.93 "Hazardous materials" means any material that has been designated as hazardous under 49 U.S.C. 5103 and is required to be placarded under subpart F of 49 CFR part 172

Diesel is classified as a **Class 3 combustible liquid** and requires placarding, <u>unless</u> its stored in non-bulk packages of combustible liquids:

- **49 CFR 171.8** "Non-bulk packaging means a packaging which has: (1) A maximum capacity of 450 L (119 gallons) or less as a receptacle for a liquid;"
- **49 CFR 172.500** "Applicability of placarding requirements...(b) This subpart does not apply to—...(5) Combustible liquids in non-bulk packagings."
- **49 CFR 173.150** "(f) Combustible liquids...(2) The requirements in this subchapter do not apply to a material classed as a combustible liquid in a non-bulk packaging."

Boss Trailers' Multi-Tank Trailers feature multiple 110-gallon tanks, each independently connected to a shared pump via a manifold system. This design ensures complete separation between tanks during transport, keeping each container within the non-bulk classification.

CDL REQUIREMENTS & VEHICLE WEIGHT

In many situations, a CDL is not required to tow a Multi-Tank Trailer. However, larger trucks and fuel trailers may require one due to their total weight. A CDL is necessary for combination vehicles only if both of these conditions apply :

- The Gross Combination Vehicle Weight (GCWR) exceeds 26,000 lbs., and
- The Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of the trailer is over 10,000 lbs.

Regulations state that both must apply for a CDL to be required.

If the trailer GVWR and the vehicle GVWR add up to more than 26,000 lbs GCWR, CDL is required.
